




IN TRADITIONAL MEDICARE, MODEST GROWTH IN THE HOME CARE WORKFORCE IS LARGELY DRIVEN BY NURSE PRACTITIONERS

In exploring recent trends in the US home-based medical care workforce that serves traditional (fee-for-service) Medicare beneficiaries, researchers drew several conclusions:

1. Steady increase of home-based medical care providers from 2012 to 2016



The overall number of home-based medical care providers increased from 14,100 in 2012 to around 16,600 in 2016.

2. Low participation among providers in traditional Medicare



Only 0.7 percent of physicians in Medicare







Most home care providers made fewer than 200 home visits annually to traditional Medicare beneficiaries

3. Growth in the workforce attributed almost entirely to nurse practitioners



(a 92% increase), whereas the number of home-based medical care physicians did not increase.

4. Providers "come in and out" of the workforce every year
